Having dried out and written this piece, it is lunchtime and I look forward to good food now, this evening and again tomorrow, unlike so many around the world suffering from hunger and treatable diseases. Apart from one sticky patch, I have always found some sort of paid work, I did not go hungry, obtained free medical attention, travelled to some extraordinary places, met interesting people, made many friends and had fun.

Enough of my ramblings (physical and metaphorical); while I cannot organise world peace, solve the problems of hunger or disease, I should be thankful more often to whichever god looks after me for the life I enjoy ...... and remind myself not to toss away every begging letter thoughtlessly without helping as often as I can because there are people out there whose lives are hugely different.

PS My second name is not Pollyanna...... I am gloomy sometimes!


The team from Royal British Legion Thornbury are looking forward to seeing old friends again, and of course to meeting new ones.



### To Cromhall Residents

Christmas is coming and as many of you will know this is a time when the Cromhall Poor Allotment Charity distributes its annual income in the form of vouchers for use in Cromhall shop.

The mandate of this charity is to help those in need. Individuals in specific hardship can always apply to the trustees for help at any time of the year.

However, identifying those in need is impossible for the trustees and they agree to distribute the annual income to all folks over 65 and have been in the village for 5 years or more. It may not always be in the form of vouchers for use in the village shop as it is up to the trustees to determine the gift and there is only one gift issued per household.

Most years one or two may ask why didn't they get the gift?

Two simple answers:

- 1) That the charity isn't aware of that person we have no idea of peoples' ages nor when they moved here.
- 2) Data protection regulations now requires me to gain written permission from recipients to keep their name on a list. Has this been done by completing an application form?


I cannot guarantee that new applicants will receive the gift this year, but they will in 2021.

## **Consultation on Thornbury High Street**



A public consultation on the Experimental Traffic Order, introduced in June by South Gloucestershire Council, is open until 31st January 2021.

Anyone can make comments, submit support, objections or suggestions. The

Council will consider all submissions during the trial period before deciding on whether to make the changes permanent.

Local groups are being contacted to hear their feedback. If you would like to arrange a session with council officers for your group and you are not contacted within the next few weeks, please do get in touch.

Comments must be sent in writing and should preferably be submitted using the online questionnaire which will be available on the consultation page until the closing date, although email and letter responses will also be accepted.



## Harry's House

With so much building going on around us, it's difficult to imagine the sort of houses which many of our ancestors lived in. Until the mid-1980s a small cottage survived in Sundayshill Lane, Falfield, which would not be considered fit for habitation in today's world and yet it was occupied uncomplainingly by a man whose life spanned most of the 20<sup>th</sup> century.

Harry Nelmes' cottage occupied a site next to Sundayshill House. It was a one-storey building



consisting of three rooms, two of which were interconnected but the kitchen and living room were separate and had to be accessed by going outside to get from one room to the other. The bedroom was adjacent to the living room via a step. There were flagstone floors and the house flooded when there was heavy rainfall. It was typical of the sort of dwelling occupied by labourers in the 1800s, many of which had earth floors. Harry and his wife, Florence, occupied the house from their marriage in 1929 until Harry's death in 1983. Florence had predeceased him in 1961.

Mrs Linda Smith and her husband, Graham, were friends and neighbours of Harry's and in 1981 one of Linda's friends interviewed Harry about life in his cottage. The cottage was still basic in its amenities; there was no gas or electricity, one tap provided its cold-water supply and a there was a chemical toilet in the garden. Hot water was provided by heating a kettle.

He told the interviewer that he lit his fire every day of the year in order to boil his kettle and to have a warm oven. Once darkness fell, Harry lit his oil lamp or just sat in the firelight. He remarked that as he had no electricity, he had no TV. His battery-run radio sometimes provided him with entertainment.

Harry had started life in Moorslade Lane, probably in the property now known as Glen Cottage, where he appears on the 1901 census with his sister, parents, grandparents and a lodger. Harry's grandfather, George, then aged 72, was a shepherd on a farm and the house probably went with the job. This was a 'two-up, two-down' with lean-to scullery. According to the 1871 census, the family was already living in Moorslade where it is recorded that George was born in Lower Stone whilst his wife, Esther, originated from Woodford. The six children living at home at that point had all been born in Moorslade.

An item in the Gloucester Echo dated Tuesday March 31<sup>st</sup> 1908 and headed: 'Diamond Jubilee Wedding' reveals more about Harry's grandparents:

'Mr and Mrs George Nelmes of Falfield, celebrate today the sixtieth anniversary of their wedding. They have 5 sons, 4 daughters, 41 grandchildren and 45 great-grandchildren. Mr Nelmes has worked on the estate of Sir George Jenkinson for over 50 years as a shepherd and in other capacities, and fulfilled certain duties up to last Easter, when a severe illness incapacitated him from work. His reward for faithful service is that he is well provided for by Sir George Jenkinson.'

Unfortunately by 1911 the census reveals that George had died and the family had moved to Sundayshill Lane. Harry's mother had also died and he was now living with his father, grandmother and younger sister, presumably in the cottage he would occupy for the rest of his life.

In 1929 Harry married Florence Miller and a report of their wedding appeared in the Western Daily Press headed 'Falfield: Nelmes - Miller Wedding' and dated Tuesday October 22<sup>nd</sup> 1929:

'St George's Church, Falfield, was the scene of a pretty wedding on Saturday, the contracting parties being Mr George Henry Nelmes, elder son of Mr William Nelmes of Sunday's Hill, and Miss

Florence Miller, second daughter of Mr & Mrs George Miller, also of Sunday's Hill. The vicar, The Rev A. D. Lough officiated, and the service was fully choral, with Miss B. Lough at the organ. The bride, given away by her father, was attired in ivory crêpe-de-Chine, with lace veil, and wore a wreath of orange blossom. Her bouquet was of white chrysanthemums and roses. Bridesmaids in attendance were her sister, Miss Bessie Miller, and the Misses Winifred and Kathleen Norris (nieces of the bride). They wore dresses of powder blue crêpe-de-Chine and carried bouquets of bronze chrysanthemums. Mr Sidney Davis (brother-in-law of the bridegroom) was best man and Mr J. T. Norris (brother-in-law of the bride) groomsman. A reception was held at the bride's home. The honeymoon is being spent at Salisbury.'

Growing up in the village, Harry had attended Falfield Village School where the two Misses Wil-



liams taught him, aided by a pupil teacher. He left school at the age of thirteen and his first job was on a farm where he earned five shillings (25 pence) a week; his work involved working with horses. (This was in the days before World War I and mechanisation.) He later worked as a gardener at Eastwood Park in the days when it was a Civil Defence Training School but continued to help out Mr George Lovell at Sundays Hill Farm in his spare time.

He commented how life had changed so much during his lifetime, claiming that people were happier in the olden times. Harry went on to add, "In those days everyone knew everyone else, but 'tis all strangers now." He said that he now knew only a few people in the village. He went on to express his dis-

like of towns saying that he had never liked them, especially the larger towns, such as Bristol. He even bemoaned what was happening locally saying, "Look at the size of Thornbury now - different than what it used to be, that's for sure!" (This was in 1981!!)

Harry's chief enjoyment lay in his garden where he grew a fine crop of vegetables, many of which he gave to his visitors and those who helped him out with lifts and other kindnesses because his only mode of transport was a bicycle. He said, "I get a lot of visitors, - there's someone every day and it's my way of repaying them."

Harry died in 1983 and his house was subsequently sold; the tiles were stripped from it and it was then sold on again before being demolished and a new house built on the site.

## Winterbourne Cherry Cake

#### Ingredients

4 oz margarine 8 oz self-raising flour Pinch of salt 4 oz caster sugar 5 oz glace cherries – chopped 2 eggs, beaten

1 tsp almond flavouring 2 tbsp milk, (enough to make a dropping consistency)

1 tbsp of granulated sugar (optional) 1 oz sliced almonds - optional

#### Method

Pre-heat oven to 180°C or Gas Mark 4. Flour and grease a 2lb loaf tin.

Rinse the cherries with cold water to remove the syrup, then dry them well with kitchen roll or a clean tea towel. Put in a bowl to one side.

Weigh out the flour and put 1 oz in a bowl to one side. Put the remaining 7 oz flour and salt in a mixing bowl, then add the margarine. Rub in until it resembles breadcrumbs. Stir in the caster sugar.

Add the 1 oz. of flour to the cherries and stir so they are evenly coated in the flour, then add them and stir through.

Fold in the eggs, almond flavouring and enough milk for a dropping consistency.

Put the mixture in the loaf tin and level. Make a dip along the centre of the top of the cake mix with the back of a spoon so that it will rise evenly.

Sprinkle a tbsp of granulated sugar or the sliced almonds on the top of the cake, whichever you prefer. Bake in the oven for 45 minutes until risen and golden brown. Insert a skewer into the cake – if it comes out clean, the cake is done. Leave to cool and then slice and enjoy.

## **Books for Christmas** Tony Cherry

Two of the bestselling books at Thornbury and District Museum tell the stories of the local salmon fishing industry and of Thornbury Castle. Because of current restrictions, the museum has not been open since March, but the books are still available by special arrangement. If you're trying to think of Christmas presents for yourself, for local family, or for people at a distance (to whom you could post them), these books would be great for anyone with an interest in the history of this area.

"The Glorious Uncertainty: Salmon Fishing in the River Severn" charts the story of a local industry which flourished for many hundreds of years and rapidly disappeared within the last 50 years. The book was written by Nick Large, who sadly died shortly before its publication. Nick studied the fishing methods for over 20 years and accumulated an extraordinary wealth of knowledge which is displayed within the book.

He describes, in an engaging style, five different ways that commercial fishermen went about their trade. It is illustrated with over 100 stunning photographs.

"Thornbury Castle Revisited" tells the story of Thornbury Castle throughout its 500-year history, as well as the preceding 250 years when the Stafford family were accumulating sufficient wealth and a high enough position in society to build a castle. Next year marks the 500<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the execution of its builder, Edward Stafford, third Duke of



Buckingham, by Henry VIII. The story of Stafford's beheading - and of the same fate that befell his father, a grandson and a great grandson - are told within

the book, along with accounts of others associated with the castle who met a similar grisly end.

## St Peter's Hospice - When It Matters Most

St Peter's Hospice, the only adult Hospice for the wider Bristol area, has recently launched a 12-month fundraising campaign to protect the services it is able to offer to patients with lifelimiting illnesses and their families. The Hospice has been devastated by the impact of the pandemic with all major fundraising events postponed and the temporary closure of all charity shops. De-

spite the public's ongoing support, they have a gap of over £2 million in funding this year. Actor and comedian Stephen Merchant recently visited their Inpatient Unit to announce their 'When It Mat-

All of St Peter's Hospice's services are provided free of charge and they support around 3,000 patients and their families every year. However, despite being a frontline service only 20% of their funding comes from the NHS.

Over £4 million of the Hospice's funding comes through their shops, fundraising events and donations. Although there has been a slow return of the shops and fundraising activities, income from these activities is down significantly.



A financial gap of this size will take a long time to recover from and as a result the Hospice is in the process of reviewing all services and expenditure and has already temporarily closed five beds in the Inpatient Unit (each bed costs £846 per day to run) and their Day Services (annual running cost £516,139) will be closed for the medium term.

Frank Noble, CEO of St Peter's Hospice said: "The Hospice exists because of the generosity of our supporters and we have never needed you more. Our ability to help those at home, those in need of specialist care and those who need support through bereavement during these extraordinarily difficult times is diminishing as every week goes by. We are now at the point of reviewing staffing across the Hospice -something we have never had to do before. After everything we have been through it really is heart-breaking. Making decisions that impact our services is not easy. Every decision we take is guided by the aim of minimising the impact on patients. The public's support now is more vital than ever as we move through uncertain times."


