#### Facing the challenge .......

In my youth I was an amateur athlete with a few minor successes. That experience has made me



acutely aware of the efforts, training, and dedication that is manifest in the Olympics. Just getting there is such a huge achievement, I take my hat off to every one of them, successful or not. I don't expect every participant to win a medal, just three are given out for every event. But I do expect them to return a personal best, better known as a PB. Not an unreasonable expectation given the level of competition.

But after the games we were exposed to the Paralympics. Now my admiration was matched by my astonishment. To see what these athletes could accomplish, despite their many challenges, is truly amazing. Some with one or more limbs missing or mental or psychological problems. To see a swimmer with no arms, from the shoulder competing in, say, backstroke, and winning gold medals is truly astonishing.

There are so many heart-warming memories to take away; the armless archer using his foot to hold the bow, the blind runners sprinting whilst attached to a sighted guide, wheelchair rugby – also known as murderball for the forceful way the players use their chairs to dislodge the ball, the many 'blade runners' sprinting like gazelles. I could go on but there were so many wonderful moments.

But I also wondered how Zhang Tao, an armless gold medal swimmer coped with life outside the games. How was he fed, dressed, and helped with the toilet. He must have had a wonderful support group to help him to live as normal a life as possible, given his physical restrictions. The same question can be asked about many of the severely disadvantaged athletes.

Notwithstanding all the difficulties faced, when interviewed all athletes exhibited an enthusiasm for

just being in the Olympics and competing at that level. None expressed anger or frustration at the hand they had been dealt, no mention was made of the restrictions their injuries had caused. That brought home how even the biggest hurdles will not bring down some people, the human condition is boundless in its desire and ability to rise and cope with anything thrown at them. It puts the many relatively minor physical problems we encounter into some perspective.



The Parish Council would like to advise residents that Wessex Water are carrying out essential sewerage works in Tytherington starting 4th October 2021 for approximately 8 weeks.

Wessex Water will be installing a new sewerage system from the new residential development situated to the rear of The Orchards, to a connection point in the South Eastern corner of the Jubilee Field on Stowell Hill Road. Jubilee Field will remain open, however Wessex will need to close a section of the park off to undertake the works.

Wessex will also be required to close the private track off Stowell Hill Road, directly North of the park, during working hours of 0730 – 1730, Monday to Friday.



#### **FALFIELD PARISH COUNCIL**

The Parish Council met on Wednesday 8<sup>th</sup> September during which Councillors discussed their response to the Greener Spaces - Green Infrastructure Strategy Consultation. Having reviewed the 212-page document in their response to this Consultation, the Councillors noted a number of errors and inaccuracies within the document, but the main objection was the proposed removal of parts of the green infrastructure designation from within the parish. Councillors felt that it was very important to protect the landscape within these areas as they provide attractive rural vistas and that there were important wildlife corridors worthy of protection.

As well as the usual matters of the meeting Councillors agreed to accept an offer from The Honourable Company of Gloucestershire of two English Oak trees which would be planted in 2022 as part of the Queen's Platinum Jubilee. Councillors also discussed the draft policy and criteria for the distribution of money received from the Community Infrastructure Levy and agreed that from the recommendations put forward at the meeting by Councillors this would be discussed again at their October meeting with a view to approve the policy.

Councillors also agreed to apply to register the Village Green under the Commons Act 2006 which, if successful, would mean that once registered as a green, local people will enjoy the right of recreation there, and the space would be protected forever from development.



#### **Another Cool Reception**

I was interested to read Rev Sue's account of her experience in a church where 'WELCOME' was definitely not included in their policy. (September's issue of 5 Alive.) It transported my mind back some sixty years to something I had tucked away in my 'memory box'.

Only just five years old, I started my school life at Tortworth School. On the first day there, having completely enjoyed this new experience I decided that I wanted to be a schoolteacher and, unbelievably, that remained with me. It set my goal for life. Thankfully I was fortunate enough to succeed in realising my 'dream'.

Having worked hard through three primary schools (Tortworth, then St Martha's Kindergarten at Falfield, then Thornbury Council School (now called Gillingstool), I passed the eleven plus and went to Thornbury Grammar School.

Those were seven glorious years spent there; arguably the best grammar school in Gloucestershire. With over six hundred pupils and serving a radius of over fifteen miles, (Berkeley to Horfield, Compton Greenfield to Charfield and much more). The sixth form was the 'icing on the cake' and it was now time to be seeking acceptance at a Teachers' Training College.

I was fortunate enough to find myself offered a place at Weymouth Training college for Women.



The training course in those days was for two years including three teaching practice sessions. Again, it was a wonderfully enjoyable time, with the bonus of being beside the sea! We were encouraged to make the most of the surroundings and there were no afternoon lectures. From lunch time until 4.30pm we were free. Then there were evening lectures leading towards dinner at 7.00pm. I was very happy in my new environment. New people to meet, new surroundings and just a few yards along the road towards the sea was St John's Church.

Having been in the church choir at St George's, Falfield for five or six years and a Sunday School teacher there for four years, I decided that I would rise early and attend the church service. I wore my college scarf (a very necessary piece of 'gear' in those days!) as I thought it would indicate my situation as a new student.

However, like Rev Sue, I was completely ignored by the reasonably-sized congregation. Noone smiled or nodded, let alone spoke. I glanced around expectantly with no reaction whatsoever. I was disappointed, as may be imagined.

As our unwritten family motto appears to be, 'Always do your best and don't give up', I repeated the church visit on two more occasions with the same result each time! Fortunately, the experience did not put paid to my churchgoing, but it did give a blow to my confidence.

I felt that I had done my best and it was their loss. Perhaps it was a negative experience that helped to strengthen my own notion that: A smile and a word (if only 'Hello') costs nothing to the donor and could possibly brighten the day of the recipient, regardless of age or situation.

If we all did this, surely the world could be a happier place!

#### **ROCKHAMPTON PARISH COUNCIL**

The Council held its first face to face meeting since February 2020 on Monday 23rd August 2021. The main item for the meeting was the ongoing highways issues. Cllr Riddle reported that further vehicle average speed checks on the Lower Stone Road had been completed in June which recorded an average speed of 38 mph. However, 15% of vehicles recorded were doing more than 44 mph and that this had been flagged up with the Police. Cllr Riddle went on to confirm that issues in the parish with potholes were being reported to StreetCare on an ongoing basis and it was noted that temporary repairs to the Hill Road had been completed with the intention of major repairs to be completed during 2022/2023 financial year.

Under planning two applications received were noted namely, the construction of new access and track from Sewerage Treatment Works compound on to Church View and the conversion of existing storage shed to form annexe ancillary to main dwelling at Vine Cottage.

Cllrs were informed that an inspection of the Council's assets had been undertaken between Cllr England and the Clerk and that from this inspection it was noted that action was required to some assets. Cllrs agreed discuss this at their next meeting.

The Parish Council along with other Parish Councils had received an offer of two Oak Trees from The Honourable Company of Gloucestershire to commemorate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee in 2022 and Cllrs agreed to take up this offer. Cllr Mitchell Skinner proposed that Cllrs should give further thought to how the Parish could commemorate/celebrate this event and proposed that they should discuss this in more detail at their next meeting on Monday 22<sup>nd</sup> November 2021.

#### Falfield WI



Guilda Ludwell, our President, welcomed the members to the first meeting in the Village Hall since March 2020. Although we could not sing, Jenny Pain played Jerusalem.

After the business side of the meeting Guilda introduced the Speaker, Pete Chaplain, whose talk was entitled "A Job with Bite".

Pete Chaplain spent 20 years as a Police Dog Handler. He gave a very animated talk on his work and the various dogs he had worked with ranging from a very nervous "Dena", who had to be cajoled into doing her job, to an aggressive "Major" who would have a go at anything or anyone, and sniffer dogs to seek out bombs.

The members were enthralled with his many descriptions of the jobs and his sound effects (growling and snarling)

The meeting ended with everyone having a cup of tea and catching up with friends.

#### The Hut

For most of those travelling through Falfield towards Bristol, the sight of a clump of bushes just south of the graveyard of the former chapel at Mount Pleasant is just another clump of greenery at the side of the road; what many may not know is that this is the site of 'The Hut' – a former centre of village life. The hut was a corrugated iron building erected in the early years of the 20<sup>th</sup> century on land donated by the Earl of Ducie, whose estate covered most on the eastern side of what is now the A38.

Along with the field in which it stands, it was used for village events, shows, races, fairs and other recreational purposes. The building was erected as a YMCA (Young Men's Christian Association) room where the local youths could meet together and socialise. It was well used in its time through the 1930s, 1940s and into the 1950s.

Such buildings were originally constructed during the First World War by the YMCA (Young Men's Christian Association) to offer canteen facilities to troops as well as facilities for rest and recreation. Their wartime mission was signified by the Red Trian

facilities for rest and recreation. Their wartime mission was signified by the Red Triangle emblem showing that their aim was to nourish a man's mind, body and spirit. Many were constructed near base camps, on the front lines or at railway stations – wherever large numbers of troops were likely to congregate. (There was one at Charfield, near the former station, which served as their village hall for many years.) Although Falfield may not have been adjacent to an army base or training camp, it is very likely that many troops passed through the village in WW1 just as they did later in WW2.

After the Great War, young men met there, reportedly several nights a week for darts, table tennis, a chat, a sing-song and general companionship. Joyce Rosser, who grew up in Whitfield in the 1930s, remembered her brother, Ray, and his friends Derek Sansum and Bernard Fuller forming a little band, which practised at The Hut on club nights and were even called upon to provide the music for dances when outside bands were not available.

Whist-drives, socials, pantomimes and plays were held there as well as dances. In the summer, an annual village fair was held in the field behind The Hut. Joyce recalls there being dodgems, swing-boats and Noah's Ark (roundabout of 'galloping' animals) amongst the amusements available. Candy floss and toffee apples could be purchased, which were special treats.

Of all the pastimes, Joyce's favourite was dancing. The 'hops' at the Hut were considerably enlivened by the arrival of the American GIs at the Red Cross Hospital in Tortworth Park (now the site of Leyhill Prison). Besides bringing chewing gum and nylon stockings to our locality, they brought with them the dance called

'The Jitterbug' which was the precursor of Rock and Roll. Joyce enjoyed this greatly. Sometimes she sang with the band who might have come from as far away as Bristol.

During WW2, The Hut served as a First Aid Post in connection with Air Raid Precaution as well as being the venue for concerts presented by the Falfield Dramatic and Operatic Society (an amateur group which existed mainly to lift spirits for the duration of the War). It was still the venue for village parties and social activities and apparently had an excellent dance floor but by the start of the 1950s, the increase in traffic on the A38 made it less attractive as the road became dangerous and there was no area for parking. The village school had long closed and the 'schoolroom' was used mainly for activities connected with the church but it provided a more suitable venue than its predecessor, so the 'village hall' moved to the centre of the village and The Hut fell into disuse.
