Education changes lives....

The school summer holidays are here again, providing a welcome rest from lessons and homework for pupils and teachers alike! All children in the UK have the opportunity of an education. However, across the world children are not so fortunate.

Many years ago, Roy and I spent two years teaching in a boys' secondary school in Zambia. At that time Zambia had one of the most poorly developed education systems of Britain's former colonies and less than one percent of the population were estimated to have completed primary education. Of that one percent, few were girls.

Things have improved and now education is free. However, there are insufficient school places in the towns, and in the rural areas many children do not have a school within walking distance. To meet the need for primary places, community schools have popped up in the densely populated compounds around large towns and cities. These schools receive no funding from the government and many teachers are unpaid volunteers.

Twenty years ago, we returned to Zambia with three members of St Andrew's Church and were dismayed at the poverty we saw. On our return, and after lots of consideration, we decided to

form a charity to try and change at least a few lives in and around Lusaka. It certainly changed my life!

In 2009 we helped an Anglican priest to set up two community schools in church buildings, with voluntary, untrained young men and women teaching the children. These schools are still running and now provide a basic education for around 500 pupils aged 3 – 14 years. Classrooms are too small, and classes are too large as they find it hard to turn away a child who wants to learn.

Three of us visited these two community schools in May this year, after a gap of five years due to the pandemic and we received a wonderful welcome from

both teachers and children. We experienced teaching large classes in crowded rooms and watched the children line up eagerly for school lunch. Our charity, CLinC, manages to pay for two meals a week for all 500 children.

Five of the original teachers are still there and, over the years, we have managed to enable eight of the teachers to gain Primary teaching diplomas at local colleges or universities. It is also good to get news of past students and hear how education has changed their lives, and the lives of their families.



Albert Edward Godsell 1932 - 2023

As a long-term resident of Tytherington known to so many, Albert/Albie's life was celebrated by a congregation which squeezed into the church of St James to bid him farewell – a fitting tribute to a man who had played an important part in village life and was a true local.

Albert was born and raised in Cromhall, before moving to Tytherington and later to Thornbury but he had experience of the wider world through army service and holidays

abroad.

Like most of the youngsters of his day, his schooling in Cromhall ended when he reached the age of 14 and he went to work in the quarry as an odd-job boy, arriving on his bicycle and starting work alongside his father. Albert was proud of his service to the quarry, talking animatedly about his time there and the changes he had witnessed as he rose to become foreman with the entitlement to use a yellow Land Rover!

Vehicles seem to have featured quite significantly in Albert's life. As well as a way of getting to work, his bicycle became a means of taking his future wife, Pauline (Polly), home during their courting days. Later, when called up for national service with the Royal Berkshires, Albert was a driver to an officer – not bad considering he'd never taken a driving test.

Albert was a fine sportsman. After playing football from an early age in Tytherington for the mighty Rocks, his love for the sport continued throughout his life: he spent his 80th birthday at Old

Trafford. In fact, so taken was he with Polly back in the 50s, that he chose her over a footballing career, signing a marriage certificate instead of a contract with Aldershot Town. Skittles was another skill for which Albert was well-known and which he eagerly passed on to family members.

During his national service, between 1951 and 1953, part of it spent in Eritrea, Albert became a boxer and in later years enjoyed demonstrating his shuffle to younger family members along with the 'proper' way of boxing: 'with the knuckles facing down'. Service in the military clearly had an impact on Albert's life as he became a loyal member of the British Legion in later years.



Growing up in the countryside at a time when growing your own food was a key part of daily life, Albert had a deep knowledge of plants and wildlife which made him a keen gardener; this brought him much satisfaction and pride - along with many prizes and accolades which he always accepted with real humility and grace;

His family remember him as a patient and caring husband, father and grandfather who taught the youngsters about the world around them and the things that mattered to him. His grand-daughter, Katy, in her eulogy described Albert as 'a kind, gentle and loving father and grandfather who taught us all a thing or two about how to behave properly, how to love fiercely, and how look after each other.'

Pauline would also like to thank all those who attended the service, visited her at home, sent cards, flowers and messages.

A special thanks to Sue P-M who made the service so special to the family in celebrating Albert's life.



Public urged to check if they can claim Universal Credit as £7.6bn goes unclaimed.

Citizens Advice South Gloucestershire is appealing to anyone in the region who is struggling financially to check online or contact the charity to see if they can claim Universal Credit. Emmanuelle Claverie, Lead Supervisor at Citizens Advice South Gloucestershire said: "The main point is that a lot of people think that if you are working you won't be entitled to Universal Credit. That's not necessarily the case. It's always worth going to check and there are benefits calculators available online - there's one on our website - or they can call the Help to Claim team [a national service provided by Citizens Advice] to check out their entitlement to Universal Credit."

Universal Credit was introduced to replace a number of benefits for most people including:

- Housing Benefit
- income-related Employment and Support Allowance (ESA)
- income-based Jobseeker's Allowance (JSA)
- Child Tax Credit
- Working Tax Credit
- Income Support

Claimants usually get one monthly payment to cover living costs. A couple will get one payment between the two of them. The payment is made up of a basic 'standard allowance' and extra payments that might apply depending on circumstances. Extra elements can be included if claimants are looking after children or paying for rent or childcare. Extra payments can also apply if claimants are disabled, have a health condition, are a carer for a disabled person or have a disabled child.

Emmanuelle added, "Even if people are finding they would be entitled to a very small amount of Universal Credit, it is worth applying for it because it opens up other entitlements, including Cost of Living payments and possible entitlement to Council Tax Reduction which is another benefit which is not claimed very much."

In 2022, Citizens Advice South Gloucestershire helped 4,778 people with 22,493 issues and saved clients a combined total of £4.4 million - that is the equivalent of £920 back in the pocket of each person it helped.

Rockhampton Parish Council Report

Following the re-run of the election held in June, four Councillors were returned. The four Councillors returned were: Tom Cullimore, Tina Mitchell Skinner, Tony Cullimore and Henry Price.

At the first meeting of the Council following the election Anthony Phillips was co-opted on to the Council bringing the Council up to its full complement of five members.

Cllr Cullimore was elected as Chair and Cllr Tina Mitchell Skinner was elected as Vice Chair. Cllr Cullimore took the opportunity of thanking Mike Goode who had decided to retire from the Council for his hard work and effort put in during the time he was on the Council.

Cllr Cullimore welcomed Ward Cllr Tony Williams to the meeting following his election and also Ward Cllr Matthew Riddle on his re-election to serve as our Severn Vale Ward Councillors.

Ward Cllr Riddle reported on the investigation work concerning the subsidence on the Hill Road and indicated that the work required would cost in the region of £150,000 which StreetCare hoped would be completed in the current financial year.

Further monitoring of the speed of traffic through the village had been completed in May which recorded an average speed of 35 mph. However, it was noted that 15% of traffic was travelling in excess of 45 mph. It was also confirmed that further 30 mph repeater signs were to be installed along with 30 mph roundel on the road at either end of the village.

Cllr Cullimore confirmed that the 'Village Gates' had arrived and would make the necessary arrangements to have them installed in due course.

Ward Cllr Williams informed the meeting on the current issues regarding the planned strike action by the employees of Waste contractors SUEZ. He also went on to say that there would be a forthcoming consultation relating to the Waste renewal contract due in 2025 and urged everyone to look at this when it was published and make comment.

It was agreed that a Litter Pick would take in the Autumn with a provisional date agreed of Saturday 7th October. Cllrs also agreed to commemorate the Coronation of King Charles III by planting a tree on the common. Cllr Cullimore offered to look at this and report back at the next meeting.

The Clerk reported that the internal audit for 2022/23 had been completed with Cllrs approving the auditors' recommendations along with approving the Annual Governance and Accounting Statements.

The next meeting will be held on **Monday 21st August** in the Village Hall commencing at 7.30 pm.

Ride + Stride to Save Our Historic Buildings

Gloucestershire Historic Churches Trust's Ride+Stride, will be held on **September 9th 2023**. This remarkable initiative invites participants to explore the stunning churches of

Gloucestershire and North Bristol, while raising funds for the preservation of these cherished historic buildings.

Ride + Stride encourages participants to fundraise by visiting churches in the area on the day of the event. Some try to visit as many as possible while others take their time exploring a select few. Previous participants have used various modes of transportation, including walking, cycling, public transportation, and even horse riding, as they travel between churches. On the day of the event, many churches will open their doors, providing participants with the opportunity to immerse themselves in the beauty of these magnificent buildings and enjoy refreshments along the way.

Funds raised through Ride +Stride are divided between the participant's nominated church and GHCT. The trust then uses the contributions allocated to GHCT to provide grants to churches and historic buildings throughout Gloucestershire and North Bristol. These grants play a pivotal role in ensuring the longevity of these architectural treasures, allowing them to serve as vibrant community spaces and be enjoyed by future generations. Previous grants have been utilised for roof repairs, enhancing accessibility, and improving facilities, among other vital projects.

St Leonard's, Tortworth, benefited from a GHCT grant of £4,000 in 2016 towards cleaning & preserving its stained glass.

The event welcomes everyone, whether they are members of local churches or simply admirers of the area's historic buildings.

Edward Jenner: a man who changed the face of the world

In 1796, Dr Edward Jenner of Berkeley proved that inoculation with cowpox protected against smallpox, a terrifying scourge that killed one person in twelve. Vaccination has proved to be one of the greatest success stories in medicine, culminating in the complete extermination of smallpox in 1980. Professor Gareth Williams tells the colourful story of Jenner's life as a doctor, scientist, musician, poet – and a disorganised experimenter who took over 30 years to put his cowpox theory to the test.

Gareth Williams trained in medicine in Cambridge, London and Geneva and was Dean of Medicine at Bristol University and Chair of the Trustees at the Edward Jenner Museum. His books include Angel of Death: the story of smallpox, Paralysed with Fear: the story of polio, A Monstrous Commotion: the mysteries of Loch Ness and Unravelling the Double Helix: the lost heroes of DNA. He has appeared at the Hay, Edinburgh and other book festivals, on The Briefing Room (Radio 4) and The Forum (BBC World Service) and in several TV documentaries including The Mary Berry Story.

Falfield Parish Council Report

The Parish Council election in May resulted in an uncontested election with the previous five Councillors elected unopposed. As the Parish Council consists of seven seats this leaves two vacant seats. Anyone wishing to become a member of the Parish Council should contact the Clerk for more information.

At the Annual Parish Council meeting held in May following the election, Cllr Emma Jarvis was elected as Chair.

The issue of speeding vehicles on Church Avenue during shift changes at HMP Eastwood Park had been raised by a Parishioner. Following the May meeting the Prison Governor was contacted to bring this issue to their attention and requesting that some 'slow children crossing' signs were installed. The Parish Council were subsequently advised that all staff had received a notice reminding them of the speed limit along Church Ave. This issue was raised again at the July meeting when the new Digital & Communications Manager for the prison attended to introduce herself and explain her role within the community.

In early June, the Parish Council had been notified that the Planning Officer was recommending the approval for 21 houses on the land located between Falfield Grange and the A38 by the developer Cotswold Homes. Cllrs agreed to request that this application be called in to the Development Management Committee for a determination. This resulted in a site meeting taking place which was attended by a number of the members of the Development Management Committee on 7th July as well as the Chair of the Parish Council raising a number of issues and concerns in line with the Council's objection to this planning application. This application was due to come before the Development Management Committee for determination at their meeting on 20th July. (The planning application for the development was subsequently approved by the Development Management committee by six members in support, 2 against and 1 abstention.)

At the July meeting following a suggestion from the Village Hall Management Committee that a picnic bench be located on the village green, Cllrs agreed to this. This bench is designed to accommodate six people and up to three wheelchair users and/or pushchairs. The cost of the bench and associated works is £1,770.00 which will be covered from a donation from the Village Hall Management Committee of £200.00, which was the profit from the Coronation event on the Village Green in May, £367.00 from Falfield Stores and Post Office with the balance coming from Parish Council reserves.

Regarding highways issues a concern was raised by Cllr Hathway on the condition of the pavement on the A38 between the Old Vicarage and Moorslade Lane which in some areas was very uneven and it was agreed that this should be raised with StreetCare. A parishioner also raised the issue of brambles encroaching on the footpath leading to the A38 from the Falfield Grange. Cllrs were unsure whether South Gloucestershire Council had adopted this or whether it was still the responsibility of the developer. It was agreed to ask Ward Cllr for clarification as to who was currently responsible for this footpath. Councillors were also concerned regarding the issue of the overgrown verges in Sundayshill Lane, Moorslade Lane along with the central reservation at Whitfield which had been reported to StreetCare following their June meeting and had still not been addressed.

The next Parish Council meeting will be held on **Tuesday 19th September** in the Village Hall commencing at 7.30pm.
