Cheers Drive or Bodycams?

It's a while now since a new road in Bristol was named "Cheers Drive", after the Bristolian term used to thank the bus driver. In fact, the residential road on a housing development in Speedwell, was so named in 2020 following a poll by residents in 2018.

More recently, surveys have shown that bus drivers value passengers saying, "Good morning" or "Thank you", claiming that it had a positive impact on their happiness and job satisfaction, adding that it made them feel "respected", "seen" and "appreciated". Perhaps some of us wouldn't have needed a survey to tell us something which we've known for years: that a simple greeting and expression of thanks to those who serve us is purely good manners and part of the way we were brought up.

Sadly, however, it seems that the opposite is true for many who work in the retail industry where findings by the British

Retail Consortium published earlier this year, found abuse against retail staff had almost doubled compared to pre-Covid levels. Consequently, several leading supermarkets are offering body cameras to staff who are subjected to verbal and physical abuse in the course of their daily work, which understandably causes an emotional as well as a physical impact.

It seems that the effect which the pandemic has had on society in general is being felt in so many ways which could never have been imagined at the outset. However, this may not be the only reason for the feelings of aggression and intolerance which seem so prevalent in recent times. Covid forced us into isolation but maybe we were already heading that way with the increasing amount of time that is spent looking at computer screens and not physically interacting with each other in ordinary daily life – travelling by public transport, going to the shops and taking part in social activities – youngsters have been deprived of youth clubs as well as after-school activities; even teaching has been online. Meanwhile high hedges and electronic gates seem to be an increasing feature of modern life in the countryside as well as the towns.

A pilot project by the University of Sussex, Transport for London (TfL) and social connection enterprise Neighbourly Lab found that people were more likely to acknowledge the driver on buses which had signs encouraging them to do so. Signs encouraging a "hello" or "thanks" were installed on the driver cab door and exit doors on more than 150 buses across Hammersmith in west London. Results showed that this led to an increase in passengers greeting the driver.

Dr Gillian Sandstrom, director of the Sussex Centre for Research on Kindness, said the results suggest "micro-interactions like these are more well-received, and more meaningful than most of us realise."

Rockhampton Parish Council Report

The quarterly meeting of the Parish Council took place on Monday 21st August 2023 with all Councillors present. Ward Cllr Matthew Riddle was unable to attend but sent in a written report confirming that the missing 30 mph repeaters sign were now in place which would now provide the police with legal powers should they stop anyone found speeding. He also reported that the speed monitor device would be placed on the Lower Stone Road in the coming weeks and that the latest update on the repairs to the subsidence on the Hill Road were expected to start in the Autumn.

Cllr Phillips gave a report on his attendance of the first meeting of the Severn Vale Village Agent Steering Group meeting which took place on 10th August. This had been set up to support rural locations to encourage communities to support the elderly in their community.

Cllrs noted that the applicants for the planning application for the erection of a temporary workers dwelling off Hill Road, which had been refused by South Gloucestershire Council, had submitted an appeal against its refusal. It was agreed that the Council would write to the Planning Inspectorate re-enforcing the Council's previously, raised objections.

Clirs agreed to hold the Annual Village Litter Pick on Saturday 7th October between 10am and 12 noon and to hold a further Defibrillator Awareness training in the Cricket Pavilion on the Common on Saturday 11th November.

In the Clerk's report it was noted that the Council's Annual Governance and Accountability Return for 2022/23 had been submitted to the External Auditors for exemption, and that the period for the exercise of public rights ended on 4th August, during which time no request had been made by the public to view the accounts.

Other items discussed were the Council's proposed maintenance programme going forward, the installation of the Village Gates and the Kings Coronation Commemorative tree.

Details of the minutes from this meeting can be found on the Council's website. The next meeting will take place on **Monday 27**th **November** in the Village Hall, commencing at 7.30 pm.

Planting seeds of hope amid crisis in Sri Lanka

Across the UK, churches and communities are getting together to celebrate Harvest. 8,000 miles away in Sri Lanka, people affected by leprosy are struggling to eat.

Sivamalar lives in the northern tip of Sri Lanka. When she was diagnosed with leprosy over 10 years ago, everything changed. The stigma that so unjustly accompanies leprosy had left her struggling with low self-esteem. "I felt I was living in a dark world", she said.

Then, the economic crisis hit in 2020. Like so many families affected by leprosy, Sivamalar felt the impacts acutely. Providing for her family of eight became hard. "Supporting the family was a nightmare," Sivamalar told us. "The days we could eat one decent meal were blessed days".

Sivamalar's story is unfortunately not unique. Amid economic chaos, so many of the people affected by leprosy that we've met have shared their similar experiences. For them, just finding enough to feed their families has been nearly impossible.

One of TLM's partners, KKM, reached out to Sivamalar, and equipped her with what she needed to start gardening. Now she's growing pumpkins and other vegetables. Sivamalar took to it immediately. Now, her family has enough to eat. For many of us, it's hard to imagine what a blessing this must be! What's more, Sivamalar is selling any surplus produce, generating an income that will sustain her family for years to come.

Setting the Scene (3)

This extract from 'We Grew Up in Falfield' by Ann Riddiford, continues our journey through the village travelling south. Our last venue (in June) was at the top of Mount Pleasant, at The Hut in the field just after the former chapel.

The red-brick house at the end of the field, which was named 'Southview' and was at the top of Gambril Lane, was built to house the chauffeur for Whitfield House (Tortworth Estate property). In its original state, it was a perfect cube with a perfect pyramid roof, topped by a single chimney. I always thought of it as a giant scale dolls' house. However, the proportions have since been altered and this has destroyed the effect. Its name now, I believe, is Gambril House and is adorned by trees. The houses in Gambril Lane were all for housing Tortworth Estate employees. Many of whom worked on Example Farm. Clementine Cottage also had a connection with the estate and at one time housed one of the gardeners for Whitfield House.

Travelling on, one reaches Whitfield Gate Farm, again a Tortworth Estate property. It derives its name from the fact that there were heavy, wooden double gates across the driveway to Whitfield House (formerly the Park Hotel) and further on to Example Farm., more recently known as Whitfield Farm. This area was the hub of the Tortworth Estate ownership in Whitfield. Whitfield House was originally built as the home of Lord Moreton, the heir apparent to the Ducie title. However, things did not quite work out this way, which is another story.

Returning to the main road, at the other side of the once-gated driveway is Victoria Cottage, which I have a strong feeling was once an inn. I recall my father, who was always gathering bits of information in his capacity as a village postman, relating that he had been told that the cottage was so named because Queen Victoria had once stopped her carriage there to request a glass of water. I have always hoped that it was true because it is such a lovely story.

My reasons for believing it may have been an inn, are based mainly on the design of the building and its outside features. Someone once told me that he thought Whitfield Gate Farm had been an inn but I would doubt that, and think that somewhere along the line the story had become confused. Victoria Cottage, by its features, is far more indicative of a hostelry.

Following on along the road, there are two sets of semi-detached cottages, now almost unrecognisable from forty or fifty years ago. These also had connections with Tortworth Estate.

The house now known as Whitfield House Farm I have not investigated, but it possibly had Tortworth Estate associations. The next two properties, associated for many years with the Sams family, had connections with Mount Pleasant chapel, if not directly with the Tortworth Estate.

The larger house, Wellspring House, was the home of Mr and Mrs Shield Eley. He was a great non-conformist preacher and led services at Mount Pleasant Chapel. He was also chaplain to the travelling families who made their way up and down the main road through the village for the hop-picking season in Hereford and Worcester.

Next door, in the smaller property, lived Mr Edwin Child, a poultry keeper. He was also closely involved with Mount Pleasant chapel. He taught at the Sunday School and generally assisted. I once met a lady who had been taught at the Chapel Sunday School by Edwin Child's daughter.

Part of the inscription on James Shield Eley 's grave in the chapel graveyard reads:

Also of the above James Shield Eley who fell asleep January 2nd 1945 aged 77 years

From the Hop Pickers' Mission 34 years Faithful Service

Land and properties in Brinkmarsh Lane were all attached to Tortworth Estate, as were many in the Iron Hogg Lane area. Little Whitfield Farm was another such a property. Probably the cottage homes on that side of the road now no longer on the main road, but now situated on the Thornbury road, were originally homes for farm workers.

And so it continues up the old A38 (now only a link road), over Buckover, where, as far as I know, both farms and their tied cottages still belong to Tortworth Estate. At this point, continuing south one enters the parish of Thornbury.

By contrast, if we return to the point where we started, - Mount Pleasant, - having climbed the hill from Falfield village, and avert our eyes to our right instead of to our left, we are confronted by another magnificent sight. Again, there is a lovely mansion, not so shrouded in trees, but set in beautiful parkland. We are looking at Eastwood Park with its mansion; for many years the home of the Jenkinson family.

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Local company wins grant to bring Digital Radio to South Gloucestershire

Local not for profit company, South Glos Digital Community Interest Company (SGDCIC), which is owned by Thornbury Radio, the local station for Thornbury and the surrounding area, has been awarded a grant of £3000 by Thornbury Town Council.

SGDCIC was awarded the licence by Ofcom to run Digital Radio services (known as small-scale DAB) covering Thornbury, Yate and Almondsbury areas. The proposed DAB coverage region covers a large part of the South Gloucestershire, along with the crossroads of the M4 and M5 corridors.

Nigel Lane, Director of SGDCIC said, "Thank you to Thornbury Town Council for this grant. It will be used towards to the set-up of a digital transmitter covering Thornbury and the surrounding area. Our DAB transmissions will benefit listeners across South Gloucestershire by bringing them a wider choice of radio stations including a new way to listen to Thornbury Radio."

Thornbury Radio is already available to 45,000 people in and around Thornbury and has 15 volunteers working together at the station. When DAB transmissions run by SGDCIC commence in 2024, the popular local station will be available to listeners on DAB as well as FM, smart speaker and online.

SGDCIC are continuing to raise the money needed to establish transmissions from two sites in South Gloucestershire. One site is near Thornbury and the other in Yate.

SGDCIC have engaged Nick Piggott from Muxnet as technical consultant and technical provider.

This new Digital Radio network can host up to 20 stations and SGDCIC are looking for any radio service, local, regional, or national with an interest in broadcasting to this area of South Gloucestershire. The proposed DAB service area covers listeners in and around Thornbury, Yate and Almondsbury.

Peter Reeve 1946 - 2023




Peter was born and grew up in Chester, as an only child of older parents. Growing up in the immediate post-war period when bombed-out buildings were still very much in evidence, no doubt had an influence on his choice of career as an architect.

In 1965, whilst studying at Bristol College of Advanced Technology, which later became part of Bath University, Peter met his wife, Dawn, and they married in 1969. His sudden death came just 11 days before their 54th anniversary. Peter embraced his wider family as if they were his own and the arrival of their children.

Michael and Anna, and subsequent grandchildren, added to his joy. He was a 'hands-on' father and eagerly taught his own youngsters the technical skills of DIY, gadgetry and particularly computers, which Michael suggests may have guided them towards their own careers.

As a keen photographer as well as a music lover, with a particular interest in jazz, Peter was skilled at creating slideshows of photo-



Peter's main work as an architect was done in the public sector, especially Stroud District where Dursley Swimming Pool stands as part of his legacy. He also made stringent efforts to ensure public safety in public buildings and hospitals and was fastidious in ensuring that regulations were met. The disaster which occurred at Grenfell Tower affected him deeply and he followed the subsequent enquiry with great sadness, alerting many of his friends to what was being revealed.

When measures needed to be taken to deal with the poor state of the stained glass at St Leonard's, Tortworth, Peter was key to enabling the work to be carried out; his meticulous attention to detail ensured that the restoration was done to the highest standard. He was also heavily involved in the creation of an informative booklet about the church's remarkable glass.

His association with St Leonard's was a long one, beginning at the time of the Reverend Chris Lee's ministry, when Michael and Anna were part of the children's choir. His professional skills made him an obvious choice to fill the vacancy for churchwarden, which he performed faithfully for twenty-four years. The excellent state of the fabric of the building being a testament to his care.

Peter was a passionate man whose interests and hobbies often consumed his time and attention but he was always ready to offer help to those whose understanding of technical matters lagged way behind his own. He was in his element when he could put his skills into action for the benefit of others and is remembered fondly by a friend as 'a kind, quiet and gentle soul with a shared liking for a Bakewell tart!'

He will be sorely missed and we offer our sincere condolences to his family.

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Falfield Parish Council

The September meeting took place on Tuesday 19th September with three Councillors in attendance along with Charfield Ward Councillor John O'Neill.

Councillors discussed the traffic issues at the Junction 14 of the M5 and the noise of traffic at night on the A38 when the M5 was closed. Ward Councillor O'Neill confirmed that he had spoken to National Highways who advised that the sequencing of the traffic lights had changed at the junction to help with the traffic flow during the ongoing roadworks at the Almondsbury Interchange. It was understood that the sequencing had now been amended. Regarding traffic noise at night, he stated that this was an ongoing issue within his Ward and he sympathised with Parishioners' concerns but was unable to offer a solution.

In his report to the meeting Ward Councillor O'Neil confirmed that the Local Plan Consultation was expected to be published towards the end of the year. He also advised that he had been made aware that the Local Plan could include a proposed development of 1,000 homes on land to the north of Moorslade Lane.



The Clerk informed Councillors that the Bench to commemorate the King's Coronation was now in place at the War Memorial and that the Picnic Bench, the purchase of which had been agreed to at the Council's July meeting, had been installed on the Village Green.



Councillors were advised that a reply had been

received from South Gloucestershire Council in response to the Council's letter of complaint relating to the application for 21 dwellings on the Glebe land and the issue of incorrect information being provided to the Planning Committee concerning to the walking distance from the development to the nearest crossing point on the A38. In response South Gloucestershire Council acknowledged its mistake, however the Planning Committee decided that the original decision in July to approve the application was unchanged.

The Chair & Vice Chair of the Village Hall Management Committee provided Councillors with an update on the planned refurbishment of the Hall and advised that work was expected to start on 2nd October and was expected to take approx. 4 weeks requiring the hall to be closed. The work would involve a complete rewiring of the building, widening of the doorway between the lobby and the main hall and reconfiguration of the toilets which would include the addition of a toilet for disabled use.

The Clerk went onto advise Councillors that as the Village Hall would be closed for their October meeting, so arrangements had been made to use a meeting room at HMP Eastwood Park Training Centre.

The usual financial matters were discussed which included a payment to South Gloucestershire Council for the uncontested Parish election in May and to the External Auditors BDO for undertaking the audit of the Council's finances for the year ending 31st March 2023.
