Still the season to be jolly?

I guess you will be reading this in 2024 when many of you will have taken down the decorations, put the tree out for the Council to collect and heaved a sigh of relief that **IT** is over for another year and we can get back to normal.

However, I'm writing in Advent, the start of the church's liturgical year. In the past this was widely observed as a time of abstinence, not quite as severe as Lent, but certainly a time of preparation and prayer for the coming of a baby who would change the world. In the Church we use purple vestments to purple to signify this solemn and frugal time.

How things change! Now the month of December is regarded as a frantic buying bonanza for the retail trades. A season of excess, with parties, alcohol flowing, perhaps having one too many and a headache the next day! For the majority several hundred years ago this would have been a very lean time; after the first frosts no green vegetables in the garden, the larder looking very sparse unless the thrifty housewife had bottled and preserved a bountiful summer glut, little meat unless that too had been preserved, early darkness and late sunrise was hard on the workers who lived gruelling lives on the land.

Perhaps we need to go back to the days when the 25th December heralded 12 days of feasting,



fun and general mischief. Certainly, at Court in the reigns of the Henrys and Elizabeth, there would have been a different diversion each day, a play, a masque, a grand banquet or a musical entertainment. A fool or mischief maker was crowned as the King or Lord of Misrule, generally encouraging everyone to break as many rules and niceties as he could devise, all the while keeping an eye on the royal persons for fear of later losing his head. The gentry waited on their servants at a banquet and the two usually distant classes made merry together. (No doubt the hardworking servants would have prepared this meal!)

The common folk (you and me!) also had fun during the twelve days. Work was kept to what was absolutely necessary and the community came together to enjoy feasting, often pooling resources to ensure everyone was able to join in. Church on Christmas Day was the beginning of the celebrations, rather like at Court, a Lord of Misrule was elected. The Landlords and their Ladies often provided a celebration meal, where they served their staff. Carol singers would join up with folk who owned a pipe, fiddle, or maybe a drum, to entertain their neighbours, not as we sing carols before Christmas. It is suggested that this tradition was to make begging seem less demeaning, there were so many in need and little work was available during the winter.

The origins of Boxing Day is shrouded in the mists of time. Maybe it was a time when the servants received their new uniforms in a box from their masters, (what a jolly, generous gift!) or the gifts received the day before were put away safely in their boxes; I've read several other equally unlikely ideas. The 26th was also St. Stephen's Day, when decorated ploughs would be hauled through the village for a blessing at the church gate, ensuring a good harvest the next year.

We mustn't forget Mumming, dating back centuries, with St. George, the Turkish Snipe, the Doctor, Old King Cole (who had a wooden leg and 12 children) and various local additions. I'm not sure how these go together but much larking about and fun was had, particularly with Dr. Opliss Popliss Drops. 'What are they?' you ask. I've no idea. Answers to this and any other queries on a postcard to the Editor.

The Big Garden Birdwatch

The Royal Society for the Protection of Birds (RSPB) Big Garden Birdwatch is the largest wildlife survey in the UK and takes place on the last week-end in January.

Last year in the UK, over half a million people took part in Big Garden Birdwatch 2023, counting a massive 9.1 million birds!



House Sparrows were the most nu-

merous but counts of these are down by 57% compared to the first Birdwatch in 1979. In fact, we've lost 38 million birds from UK skies in the last 60 years, so with birds facing increasing challenges to their habitat, it's more important than ever to get involved in the Birdwatch. Every bird you do – or don't – count will give us a valuable insight into how garden birds are faring.

It's easy to take part. Just spend an hour watching the birds in your patch, whether it's your garden your balcony or your local park, between 26 and 28 January, and record the birds that <u>land</u>. (Birds that fly over don't count.) Count the highest number of each species that you see at any one time - (if you see four sparrows together and another two later on, you'll record 4, not 6).

Tell the RSPB what you saw, even if that's nothing at all! You can submit your results online or by post.

End of Cromhall Road Safety Project - Community Update

Two years ago, Cromhall Road Safety Project was formed as a community group to improve road safety in Cromhall, in particular to address the issue of vehicles speeding through the village, which continues to pose a threat to people's safety. As a team we have worked with the following organisations to raise the importance of the issue and to seek their support:

- Member of Parliament for Thornbury and Yate, Luke Hall
- The Police and Crime Commissioner for Avon and Somerset, Mark Shelford
- The Chief Constable for Avon and Somerset Police, Sarah Crew
- The Avon and Somerset Police Road Safety Team, led by Damien Devanny
- South Gloucestershire Council Road Safety Team
- Cromhall Parish Council, and more

We have achieved a lot over the last two years: Setting up the Community Speed Watch Group, securing funding from a couple of sponsors for a Digital Speed Watch System (using Automatic Number Plate Recognition technology) and developing a good understanding of how to certify and operate such a system. The use of a Digital Speed Watch System was considered key to finally getting on top of the problem, as a similar system has been used successfully for a number of years in the nearby Parish of Kingswood, Gloucestershire. Also, other alternatives researched were deemed to be ineffective.

However, a spokesperson for the Avon and Somerset Police Road Safety Team recently announced they were to review their support for Digital Speed Watch Systems as part of a wider review of Community Speed Watch. They plan to report the outcome in January 2024.

Additionally, over the past 2 years, we have engaged with Cromhall Parish Council to seek their support in the ownership of the system, their support being critical to the procurement and operation of any system within the village. Unfortunately, despite best efforts, the Parish Council has not been supportive of it and has never worked jointly with the project, which has been surprising and very disappointing for the team. This lack of support from our own Parish Council, plus the review being conducted by the Police, means that the project cannot proceed any further.

Finally, it must be said that, the resolution of road safety issues in the village now sits with Cromhall Parish Council. From now on, we would urge members of the community to contact the Parish Council to raise any road safety concerns and to hold them accountable for resolving such matters.



Cherry King 1927 – 2023



Following her death last November, the life of one of the stalwarts of Tortworth, Cherry King, was celebrated in the church where she had worshipped for over seventy years. A faithful member of St Leonard's, she was active in most areas of its life, serving on the PCC for many years and continuing to worship there after moving to Bagstone. On her visits last year, to Soup Lunch, Cream Teas and Sunday services, she was delighted to meet up with old friends.

Cherry moved to Tortworth in January 1951 following her marriage to David King and threw herself into her new role as farmer's wife. Her skills were evident in her garden where flowers and vegetables thrived, and inside the farm she was

adept at decorating and furnishing their home whilst David set about creating a tennis court, which provided many happy hours of entertainment for all their friends. They loved entertaining; afternoon teas on Sunday with the best china, and home-made scones and cakes, and sandwiches with wafer thin bread. Weekly summer tennis parties followed by a bring and share supper, and in winter, dinner parties and big Sunday lunches.

Cherry's training for life as a farmer's wife began when as Cherry Christine Wilcox she arrived in the village of Pendock on the Worcestershire/ Gloucestershire border in September 1927, joining her parents and older brother, Frank. Later, younger brother, Richard, also arrived. As a little girl she helped with a variety of tasks in and outdoors

When Cherry was 11,her father moved to Manor Farm at Baunton, near Cirencester, where she began her secondary education. Cherry was a clever girl who loved school, but her mother's long-term illness meant that she was unable to go on to further education and at 15 she left to help out at home. During the war years she helped with running the house: cooking for the family, and also the two prisoners of war, Harry and Joachim, who had been sent to help on the farm. She even recalled that when a team of Polish refugees brought the threshing machine to the farm, she was able to augment their meagre rations. She helped outside as well, stooking sheaves and passing them up to the man who was making the ricks.

Having joined the local Young Farmers Club with her brother, Frank, Cherry was a popular sociable, bright and pretty girl who soon caught the eye of David King. They loved dancing together, and David soon realised that she was the perfect partner for an ambitious and passionate farmer!

Between 1952 and 1955 daughters Janet and Ruth, followed by son, Christopher, had arrived. Busy as she was Cherry still somehow found time to make beautiful, smocked dresses, and hand knitted jumpers. In village life these skills were in evidence at annual church fêtes at The Rectory where Cherry ran the "New Stall", which she stocked with hand-made aprons, and embroidered tablecloths.

Cherry's 96 years have seen many changes in the world. Throughout this time her life revolved around three main themes: family, friends and farming. She gave generously of her time and her skills to everyone. She was a born optimist, but also courageous and determined. No matter what life threw at her she never grumbled or moped – but looked for ways to make things better and then got on with it - doing yoga in her 90s and continuing daily exercises even after her last episode in hospital.

Cherry certainly made the most of the gift of her long life – and set a great example for us all to do the same!!



Community Arboretum urgently fundraising to ensure the future of Mental Health & Wellbeing groups

Tortworth Forest Centre CIC based in The Dell at Tortworth Arboretum is fundraising to replace their minibus which is vital for providing free transport to volunteers and participants so they can access the community arboretum where people and trees thrive together.
